After 18, or even age 21, when education supports end, what becomes of autistic adults?

Employment rates for autistic adults in Canada is only 14.3% in comparison to the rate for people with all disabilities which hovers around 45%. Some autistics enjoy a level of autonomy. Others require complex care and supports, most often provided by aging parents and siblings.

Autism Home Base is committed to enhancing the quality of life for autistics and their lifelong caregivers. We have built a growing community of peers where neurodivergence is accepted and appreciated.

Our volunteer Board of Directors is honoured to govern this innovative charity on behalf of the families of Autism Home Base. They have banded together to share resources and build a place of belonging for autistic adults.

We prioritize the mental wellness of our members by offering social, recreational, and skills development opportunities - experiences for families to enjoy together, and alongside other families who live autism.

We are so proud of our passionate and committed staff team who consistently go above and beyond toward a vision where no one lives in isolation and participants realize their best life. 

2023 in Review - Our Supporters
