Our charity is governed by a volunteer Board of Directors comprised of members with relevant lived experience as well as caring community leaders.

The Board sets the strategic goals for the corporation and meets regularly to assess impact, oversee finances, and ensure adequate policies, infrastructure and resources are available to deliver our mission.

The Board is supported by the Chief Executive Officer who manages the operations including staffing, revenue and expenses, program delivery and stakeholder engagement.

Four part-time staff, three summer students, and a slew of volunteers propelled the organization forward through unprecedented times.






No longer alone, we are stronger, together. Let's use our combined forces to create the community we envision.

#### REIMAGINING PROGRAM DELIVERY





It is a testament to the resilience of our members that they remained connected through virtual and hybrid program delivery.

#### Offered weekly

Caring Connections, Skit Club, Sensory Seekers, Gym and Swim, Move It and Mix it, Games Café.

#### Offered monthly

Indies (community excursions for independent adults), Moms' Mixers and Guys' Nights, Games Group, RPGs including D&D, Full STEAM Fridays (Snapology, Scientists in School), and Movie Nights.

#### At the hub

Weekday drop-in visits saw members relax in our lounge areas and new Zen room. Here members can use the self-serve kitchen, bring a snack, or find a quiet spot to create art, read, or write.

The Garden Club transformed our exterior garden boxes.



#### Seasonal

**Living Life to the Full**, an 8-week wellness program was delivered virtually for caregivers.

Families connected at our annual Summer picnic, as well as our Halloween and Holiday parties.

In July and August, AHB members were back in the hub and out in the community in small social pods of 3-5 members for morning, afternoon, or evening sessions. Through **Summer Palooza**, peer-to-peer groupings found members experiencing greater engagement, stronger emotional support, and deepened friendships.

The **Possibilities Program**, a highly customized goals-driven program, was piloted for four families over 12 weeks. Two worked on tolerating new environments, activities, & people. Two worked on developing and practicing healthy relationships. We aim to reintroduce this supported program as restrictions allow.





This year, nearly 200 participants from more than 70 families enjoyed sports, recreation, arts, social and wellness offerings.



#### **AUTISM AFTER 18 CHAMPIONS**





Our charity is growing, thanks to the unwavering support of our donors and sponsors.

Autism Home Base receives no core government funding. So COVID restrictions hit our revenue options harder than some charities.

Unable to host our annual gala for the second year in a row, we instead presented a television broadcast through Rogers, a virtual celebration of World Autism Day. We are grateful to our volunteer production team and the many community and business leaders who sponsored Allies for Autism 2021.

We received a resilient Communities project grant through the **Ontario Trillium Foundation** to extend the hub hours for evening programs, and to bring in fundraising and partnership expertise.

Funding from Canada Community Revitalization Fund (CCRF) through Durham Community Foundation helped recover extra costs incurred to serve members remotely.

We received federal and provincial grants to hire summer students. And a federal grant through Enabling Accessibility Fund that turned a storage room into our Zen room.





Private foundations fund special projects and programs that drive innovation. In 2021, that included the Harry Foster Foundation, Ballard Foundation and lead returning grantor, Unity For Autism. We are grateful for the continued support through community grants from the City of Oshawa, Town of Whitby and Municipality of Clarington.

Corporate leaders Elexicon Energy, Ontario Power Generation, TD Canada Trust, Tribute Communities, Meridian Credit Union, Durham Regional Police Services Board, and Sobeys are joined by Unifor Local 222 and LiUNA Local 183.

Service club volunteers work tirelessly to raise funds to support those in need locally and internationally. We are especially grateful to Bowmanville, Courtice, Ajax and Pickering Rotary club members, as well as the Newcastle Lions for their efforts and continued support.


